St. Paul's Church is very blessed to be celebrating 158 years in Quarryville, at the light on the corner. We are a place where individuals and families come together, in the name of Jesus, for worship and fellowship.

As a church we come together with our community to worship and provide needed life sustaining ministries. In 2007 we began participating with Angel Food Ministry to help everyone in the community by providing good, healthy food for their families at low cost. If you eat, you qualify! We are also the home of Noah's Ark Nursery School which has been serving our area since 1983. There we provide a Christian based education for 130 - 170 children ages 2 to 5 years old. Our Sunday activities begin with Sunday School for all ages at 9:15am followed with a blended worship service at 10:30am. Senator Lloyd Smucker

Most people are convinced that state government could operate more efficiently and cost-effectively, if only sound business principles were applied more often.

Having run a private business for twenty-five years, I saw first-hand how rapidly increasing state spending and constantly expanding state regulations often worked against job creation and economic vitality. That experience contributed to my decision to run for state Senate.

The tough economy has thrown Pennsylvania additional challenges, such as the UC debt and transportation project backlog. The prolonged recession and the subsequent revenue shortfalls make it essential to cut back on state spending. That will also mean overhauling overcommitted programs, such as the public pension plans. Fiscal restraint cannot be temporary; it is a commitment to be kept year after year.

As decisions on where to cut are made, it is important to remember that political popularity is not the same as program effectiveness. Just because there is a constituency for a certain program does not mean the results are apparent or that the money is being well-spent.

The most important principle is to reject tax increases that fuel more spending. Instead, spending must be geared back to fit within anticipated revenue, and available funds have to be better targeted to the most essential needs.

Jobs for Pennsylvanians

Across our state and nation, there is an overwhelming outcry for government to do something to help people find work. High unemployment is holding our economy back from a full recovery and government can do more to institute policies that will help employers and potential employees.

I, along with my House Republican colleagues, am promoting a package of bills called "Keystone Jobs" to help employers keep Pennsylvanians employed and to create a way for those currently without a job to get the training and certification they need.

Reps. Stan Saylor (R-York) and Curt Sonney (R-Erie) have introduced legislation establishing the Keystone Works Program, which is intended to help relieve both short-term and long-term unemployment.

In addition, the Shared Works Program, would help employers avoid layoffs by reducing hours and wages and allowing those employees to collect a pro rata portion of unemployment benefits.

Rep. Frank Farry (R-Bucks) introduced another key component of Keystone Jobs, meant to encourage unemployment claimants to seek career training. If House Bill 2472 passes, eligible claimants will not be denied unemployment benefits while enrolled in short-term training or certification programs, incentivizing people toward career training.

Pennsylvania currently has the highest unemployment rate we have seen in more than 25 years. It is time we did something to put people back to work. Employers are afraid to hire and maintain employees during the economic recession, but House Republicans have plans to help lift the financial burden on businesses so Pennsylvania experiences much-needed job growth and economic stability for all its residents.
